

Vincent Murphy Vice President of Finance

As the Vice President of Finance for the National Organization for Rare Disorders (NORD®), Vincent Murphy is responsible for all the financial matters of the organization. This includes oversight of NORD's accounting functions, which include the payroll and accounts payable and accounts receivable functions of the organization. In addition, Vin is responsible for financial reporting to NORD's stakeholders and working with its board members, its bankers and its auditors. He is also responsible for overseeing the development of NORD's annual budget as well as long-term financial forecasts and the financial aspects of the organization's strategic plan.

Vin is a seasoned nonprofit finance professional with over 20 years of experience, including 12 years in health care. Prior to joining NORD, he worked as consultant for Ariadne Labs, a joint venture of the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health and Brigham and Women's Hospital. At Ariadne, Vin oversaw the selection and ultimately the successful implementation of a cloud based budgeting and financial reporting tool, which led to more accurate and timely budgeting and financial reporting for the organization.

Before consulting for Ariadne Labs, Vin was the Controller of BPE, a nonprofit educational organization. In addition to running the accounting function of the organization, he oversaw the upgrade of a new cloud-based payroll and timesheet system. Before BPE, Vin was the Assistant Controller at WGBH Educational Foundation, where he directed the successful merger of the accounting department at its subsidiary station, Springfield, MA-based WGBY, into the main accounting department located in Brighton, MA. Prior to WGBH, Vin was the controller at various nonprofit long-term health care facilities in Massachusetts.

In addition to having a Certified Public Accounting license from the Division of Accountancy of Massachusetts, Vin earned an MBA in Accountancy from Bentley College in Waltham, MA, and a BA in Financial Economics from Saint Anselm College in Manchester, NH.
